OBEDIENCE

THE TITLE COUNT GOES ON!

In the Winter 1983 issue of the News we reported on twelve new obedience titles in a twelve month period. Now we have nine more AKC titles and one Certificate of Gameness in a six month period. Perhaps the most exciting title is a TDX (Tracking Dog Excellent) degree earned by a Norwich, Chidley Peregrin Took, owned by Olive C. Hobbs of Ohio. Pippin, as the little dog is called, is only the second terrier to gain a TDX. The first terrier was a Soft Coated Wheaten and now a third terrier, also a Soft Coated Wheaten, has attained the title. The TDX was established by AKC as an advanced tracking test in 1980. It is a very difficult test even for a large dog that is bred for tracking so congratulations are certainly in order for Pippin and Ms. Hobbs.

We have six new Companion Dogs, three Norfolk and three Norwich. Anne Beeler put the CD on her Norfolk, Parcott's New Garden Dunstan, gaining the third leg in September 1983. Anne wrote that it took them over two years and somewhat more than the minimum three trials, but she deserves credit for hanging in there. To quote from her letter, "Take one inept handler and one bright and independent Norfolk, and you get interesting variations. There was the 'ricochet recall' when he rebounded off my knees; the 'judge-kissing' on the stand; the down which he performed rear-end towards the judge, and the 'premature exit'". (Actually we have observed all of these behaviors at one time or another at various trials.)

Another new CD Norfolk is Turkhill's Black Top owned by Joan Eckert, John W. Wood and Nancy Marsman. Nancy Parker wrote to say that she has finished her young Norfolk, Terolin's Trinket of C.J., in one weekend in Maine. Saturday, October 8th she qualified with 189; Sunday she earned a 193 and 4th place with forty-five dogs in her class and Monday's

score was 190. What a great way to do it!

One new Norwich CD title belongs to Wakerobin Brewster owned by Patricia A. Whittle. Brewster was mentioned in the Winter Issue as having two legs on his CDX but this was a misprint and should have been two legs on the CD. He now has the third leg and the title. A brand new CD (pending AKC confirmation) belongs to Ch. Laetans Ebenezer and Marcy Congdon. We happen to know that 'Nezer is already retrieving his dumbbell and is training in an Open class. Marcy is also busy training several other of her Norwich. The third CD Norwich is Windyhill Miss Daisy, owned by Kimberly Dwyer and handled by Meredith Dwyer.

Meredith handled her own Norwich, Li'l Abner's Billy Bear, CD to his CDX in the late fall. Ivan, as the dog is called, is starting Utility work. Meredith writes that Ivan is nine years old so apparently you can teach an old dog new tricks. In our last column we noted that James A. Nisbet and his Moonwynd's Goldpenny Guy has earned their CD in three straight shows in one weekend. Now they have the CDX earned over a four day period the first weekend in

November with scores of 188, 191½ and 191½. That is real consistency!

Mary Fine showed her Ch. Castle Point Mint, UD several times, gaining scores of 193½ and 192 in Open B. Another Champion Norfolk is started toward his first obedience title. Ch. Trowsnest Kinsprit Corncob, owned by M. P. Trowbridge, has two legs towards his CD as of this writing. Sally Culley wrote from Florida where she has been having fun at Working Terrier Trials. Her many titled Norwich now has a Certificate of Gameness and her official name becomes Ch. Gustylea Fancy-Free Flashton, UD, CG. Sally points out that the dogs have a great time at the Working Trials and it is fun to see them enjoying themselves.

It is most encouraging to be able to report on so many new titles. The Norfolk and Norwich may not be the most precise workers and we may never have an Obedience Trial Champion but no one can say that those of us who train and show our dogs don't have fun. The little dogs are real crowd pleasers. The feeling of pride when your dog qualifies is most satisfying. The human/canine bond that is formed during a training program is unique. I hope more of you will try to establish that bond with your little dog, feel that pride that comes with qualify-

ing scores and have fun in the obedience ring. You'll be glad you did.

NNTC OBEDIENCE AWARDS - 1983

The 1983 Norfolk winner of the River Bend Trophy for achievement in the obedience ring is Terolin's Trinket of CJ with an average score of 190.6. Trinket is owned by Nancy Parker. NNTC medals in recognition for having earned C.D. titles were awarded to: Parcott's New Garden Dunstan, owned by Anne Beeler, and Turkhill's Black Top, Joan Eckert, John W. Wood, Jr., and Nancy Marsman, co-owners, as well as to Terolin's Trinket of CJ.

The 1983 Norwich winner of the River Bend Trophy is Wakerobin Brewster, CD owned by Pat Whittle. The Norwich winner's average score was 190.8. There were no NNTC medals awarded to Norwich for obedience titles earned in 1983 since none of the dogs achieving C.D. or T.D. titles was member-owned.

WORKING TERRIERS

If 1982 brought us a few changes in our hunting, 1983 made us completely re-evaluate and re-vamp our former style. Our first change resulted from moving from northern lower Michigan, where ground squirrels, mice and woodchucks were readily available in large or small rockpiles, to southern lower Michigan, where heavily farmed fields reduced the numbers of small rodents and where woodchucks lived in long, deep earthen dens.

Our "hunting pack" then included a neutered adult Norwich, a female adult Norwich and her two, year-old male pups, a year-old Australian Cattle Dog, an aged blind Boston Terrier male, and occasionally, an old male Basset-Beagle mix, the latter three inexperienced. The first woodchuck we encountered together was, fortunately, above ground, hidden in an old woodpile. Daisy, the Australian Cattle Dog, excited by the barks of the Norwichs, at first rushed the chuck, and was rewarded for her effort with a bite on the cheek. Quickly, however, she learned to work with the Norwichs, and the chuck was soon dispatched. (Soon after, Daisy, who was originally intended for a stock dog on the farm, began appearing regularly with woodchucks she had killed on her own!)

One of our walks led us into a neighboring farmer's field where corn was just beginning to grow, thus, we wouldn't want to dig. The dogs, however, began working a hole that was near an "electric pole island." They worked and worked without apparent progress - their barks and cries still sounded very close. Finally, we decided to go home. I managed to get four of the less-aggressive dogs to come with me, while Steve stayed at the hole urging the two inside to come out. Shortly, one appeared - with a dead baby woodchuck in its mouth. Steve praised the dog, took the chuck - then the second dog emerged - also with a dead baby woodchuck. We allowed them a few more trips down, and the count ended up with five dead young ones!

About a month later we attended our first working terrier trial. We had since sold one of the pups, and our neutered male was, we felt, too large to enter an earth, so we left him home. Teddy Moritz, of the AWTA, was our judge, and she put us completely at ease. I had a teenage girl hold Ami, our bitch, while I released her son, Troubells, in front of the Novice drain. Despite my warnings that Ami would PULL HARD, the girl was unable to hold the leash when Ami decided to get the rat herself. While Troubells was furiously working inside the drain. Ami was attempting to kill from the top. Hastily I grabbed Ami and returned her to the girl. It was too late, though, Troubells managed a fourth-place score for his efforts, but Ami, released next, raced down the hold, barked for only 15-20 seconds, and then raced out and to the place she had smelled from above, showing true terrier thinking and independence! Teddy told us later that that type of behavior is common in dogs who hunt naturally. And although we didn't qualify to try for Open, we were allowed to let our dogs try the Open drain when competition was over. We're happy to report that both dogs zipped through that earth, with its three 90° turns, in no time flat!

A couple weeks later, my dad emptied the three large corn cribs on the farm. Rats and mice were everywhere, without their usual places to hide. We would go out in the cool evenings with three Norwiches and Daisy, and work for an hour or so. Our best night gave us a total of about eight rats and 35 mice!

Our hunting here in Tennessee has been very limited as we are still adjusting to an over-abundance of fleas and ticks, the presence of poisonous snakes, and the first job I've had in several years. As your

TERRIER TOPICS

NORWICH TERRIER

Published by Norwich Terrier Club, England Review by Barbara Miller

If you haven't read it, borrow a copy, better yet rush to buy one. Certainly, "Norwich Terrier" is a collector's item. I can assure you this book isn't a shelf sitter. You'll find yourself reaching for it again and again. The book is published by the Norwich Terrier Club (of England). Its editor, compiler and writer is the noted Mrs. Marjorie Bunting. Mrs. Bunting's committee is to be congratulated for compiling the many bits and pieces to make this effort the remarkable reading it is.

The front cover invites you to open its pages and begin a joyous journey through Norwich Terrier history, care, grooming, training, breeding, showing and champions. The charming back cover asks you to begin reading once more. Within its pages you'll be treated to an intelligent relaxed style of writing. Pet owner, novice, breeder and show owner are able to benefit from the knowledge this book imparts. Begin with the Norwich history of Jack Cooke, Roughrider Jones, Doggy Lawrence and go on to Quartzhill, Whinlatter, Jericho and Ragus to name but a few of the important Norwich kennels. Throughout, Mrs. Bunting speaks, through her writing, to you not at you. She whisks you along with her, so that you may see the history as it happened and continues to happen. I found myself rereading portions of the history afraid I might have missed a point of interest. There's so much to learn from those early breeders and their steadfast interest in the quality of the breed.

The foundation set, Mrs. Bunting takes us through an important chapter on General Care. From the young puppy to the oldster, from preventive medicine and simple explanations of dog illnesses to grooming, you'll be a captive reader. If you're a beginner you'll learn. If you're a seasoned breeder, you'll learn even more.

The chapter on Showing I found to be the highlight of the book. The portion within this chapter related to anatomy is important to us all. Never have I seen such clear line drawings of the breed. Renee Willes, Norwich breeder from Sweden, is to be complimented for her detailed art work. I was pinned to the pages, each time seeing a clearer view of correct and incorrect movement. Included in this chapter is a more detailed account of proper grooming. Get ready to discard some of your old tools.

Included in "Norwich Terrier" is an interesting chapter devoted to the breed in other countries. Joan Read and Renee Willes contributed the USA and Scandinavian portions respectively. There are many photographs throughout, including some from our own Constance Larrabee.

This book was not meant to sell Norwich Terriers but to explain the development and special attributes of the breed. As a Norfolk Terrier owner and breeder I believe the goals of the book were met. This is an entertaining, informative, honest account of the breed. I urge you to make this top priority reading if you aim to preserve, protect and improve the Norwich and Norfolk Terrier breeds.

Loud applause, across the Atlantic Ocean, to you our friends, The Norwich Terrier Club and to Mrs. Bunting and her committee for this excellent work. I shall treasure it forever.

SOLAR DOG HOUSE



One of our fall projects was to build a small dog shelter, solar oriented, so the dogs could benefit from winter sun.

After a winter of usage and tests, we were pleased with the results. We found that dark bedding warmed the space considerably more than anticipated. (On a 20 degree January day, the thermometer registered 82 degrees in the solar dog house.) We settled for a medium colored bedding. (Measuring 66 degrees inside on a 20 degree day.)

During the coldest part of the winter, December to February, the dogs got to go out, individually, between the hours of 10 o'clock and 1 o'clock, the time the sun space was the warmest.



1984 NNTC SPECIALTY - A JUDGE'S IMPRESSIONS

Ed. Note - Exhibitors and onlookers alike frequently wonder what a show judge is thinking of the dogs in the ring. Mr. Robert C. Graham, judge of our May 5th Specialty Show at Bucks County K.C., has been kind enough to share his impressions of our breeds as they were represented at that show.



For nearly 20 years, on and off, I've been judging Norwich and Norfolk - probably more "off" than "on". This is my first Specialty and it was a joy for me in every way. As many of you know, they've been among my favorite breeds and now more so than ever. What's more, their people are something special. Since I emigrated to Virginia about 7 years ago, the Bill Roberts and others have briefed me in that department and your Specialty atmosphere provided an even further insight - as exemplified by that long list of donors in the catalog plus that bountiful table of goodies. It is rare that I have encountered such a delightful breed(s) with such nice people and good sportsmanship. I like your formula. I especially liked the refreshing way that most of you showed your little terriers - standing upright and not bending down to continually prop and pose the dog.

Now for a few personal observations regarding your dogs versus the Standard. Please remember that these remarks reflect my own humble opinion with which others might well and properly disagree.

Head: Most conformed. One or two skulls more

flattish than round - one or two with a trifle narrow skull.

Ears - Norwich: Generally okay. A few too large and/or out at the side.

Ears - Norfolk: Generally okay. A few *not* carried close enough to the cheek and breaking above the skull line. Several on the large size.

Eyes: A pleasure to behold. Only a few were either too large or too light for my preference. Nonetheless, there was no mistaking the keen expression on all.

Mouth: Only one or two questionable. None really bad.

Forequarters: Again, generally okay. Some 4 or 5 were out at the elbows and a similar number had slightly crooked legs. Otherwise, these same dogs were above average quality.

Body - Norwich: Very good. Just a few too long for me.

Body - Norfolk: Very good. Just a few on the too short side.

Hindquarters: No problems, although a few just missed being cow-hocked.

Tail: Generally good. Several set below the topline and one or two failed to carry erect.

Coats: Excellent. Just a few were not in proper condition or lacking in mane. One or two were without an undercoat. It has long been my personal feeling that a Norwich and Norfolk in top coat is the most "luxurious" of all terrier coats and my top placements proved it. I loved to run my fingers through those coats!

Gait: Mostly okay. Some were reluctant to move or gait properly, and in many cases I thought that more exhibitor homework was in order. My top winners had no problems in this department.

General: In all other respects, especially temperment, all was well!

A few additional comments. If it seemed that I had no difficulty in deciding between first and second, etc. - then you were wrong. Perhaps a few classes, but most of the time I had what

I call a photo finish. This was even true in the best of breed competition. Another time,

another place, and I might have done it differently.

I think that your breed(s) has come a long way. Years ago, in my experience, there seemed to be relatively few really good specimens - except for a Norwich favorite of mine in the mid 60's called "Crunch." With the passage of time I have noted a definite and constant improvement in overall quality. For example, in this Specialty I saw many very good dogs - not just a few as in the so-called "old days." That's "improvement of the breed" which I think is a bottom line.

I would be remiss not to cite Ed Resovsky, my steward, for a job beyond the call of duty. I couldn't have done it without him. This is a good chance for me to compliment your club and Ed Levy for that excellent bulletin, "The Norwich & Norfolk News." Please keep me on the mailing list.

After reading this, I guess that I liked just about everything and thoroughly enjoyed my

assignment. Again, my thanks to all of you and your dogs for putting up with me.


