

A Message From The NTCA President

Dear NTCA Members,

I am so happy to write to you for our new version of *The News*. My most sincere thanks to Dina Moore- Tzouris for taking on the Editor position! As this edition covers the period from January 2024 to today, I will concentrate on reporting to you on the most recent club happenings.

As you know, this year marks our 15th Anniversary of NTCA! Everyone who attended recent San Antonio shows had a chance to experience fantastic celebrations. The National club is gearing up to match during Montgomery the fabulous celebratory spirit that the Texas

regional Lone Star Norwich Terrier Club showed us.

I am happy to unveil news of a new Winner's Bitch Challenge Trophy in Memory of Dunbar kennel - Joan Schurr-Kefeli. The trophy was made possible with a donation by Joan's son Drew Kefeli of a dam-and-puppies sculpture, a generous donation from Beric Kennel towards making a stunning trophy base, and NTCA funds used for trophy transport.

When making your donations towards Montgomery festivities please mark your checks or note online donations accordingly. All donors will be listed in the anniversary booklet.

I would also want to update you on the upcoming ballot to allow electronic voting. The final CBL amendment proposal is currently being reviewed by the AKC's Legal Department. As soon as we receive the AKC's approval, we will be sending the ballot to the NTCA members. This measure will allow us to vote electronically

on all future ballot measures—from judges' selections to CBL amendments or breed standard revisions.

In the meantime, you will be also receiving a member-initiated ballot (still in a paper form) to amend the CBL to allow a member choice to the form of attending an annual meeting electronically or in person.

Another member-initiated proposal to amend the breed standard to allow wording for a natural tail could not be executed as written and had to be rejected by the BOD—following consultation with a Parliamentarian and the AKC. The ballot called for changing the wording "tail docked to tail natural or docked." However,

the breed standard states "Tail medium docked," and therefore the proposal could not be applied. The BOD recognizes the need to create a ballot to allow inclusion of a natural tail in the breed standard. We have asked the Standard Committee to make the properly phrased proposal, and we are committed to sending the standard revision ballot to allow natural tail. Hopefully we will be able to do this as soon as electronic voting is

written into our CBL, but I am making a promise to you that the process will not be held by a consideration for electronic ballot, and it will be sent sooner if the electronic voting is delayed beyond a few weeks from now.

CANINE NOMOGRAPHS

Why Every Breeder Needs To Have Them in Their Toolbox

Vaccines save our dogs' lives, yet overvaccination has been linked to increased risks of allergic reactions and other autoimmune disorders. Vaccine protocols are being reviewed and tweaked periodically by veterinary experts to strike the optimum balance on the risk and benefits axis. We now understand that annual vaccinations pose undue burden on the canine body. All well-informed dog owners and breeders follow updated protocols, use titers for guidance, and review the indications versus risks for non-core vaccines. We also need to understand the difference between vaccination

and immunization. Not every vaccine "works." Understanding the process helps in making the best health decisions for our dogs.

Breeders have an additional tool at our disposal for optimizing vaccine protocol for puppies – a canine nomograph. It is a blood

test of the dam that establishes the timeline for when to vaccinate her puppies. A nomograph offers two major benefits. It avoids over-

vaccination of a developing immune system of a puppy, and it showed in studies higher rates of immunity against distemper and parvovirus in puppies guided by nomographs, as compared to puppies that received the traditional vaccination protocol.

What Is A Nomograph?

A mother dog passes her antibodies against viral infections to her offspring via colostrum. Those Maternal Derived Antibodies (MDAs) protect the puppies through their early weeks of life, and they interfere with vaccines in the same way

This scientific tool gives our puppies the best start in life in terms of their immune health. they neutralize the actual disease. MDAs start breaking down over time, and so both their protection wears off, and their ability to block inoculations. Traditional vaccination protocols were spaced every few weeks, starting as early as six weeks of age, and required

three vaccinations in early puppyhood. That protocol assumed that one of these vaccines would happen at a time when MDAs no longer have power to intervene with the vaccine, but before they wear off completely and leave the puppies exposed to disease. The protocol was blind to when that point in time happened for an individual puppy, so in a sense it was wasting some of those three vaccines as it relied on overvaccination to hit the right time.

Nomographs gave us the precise answer to when that optimum time is for MDAs to still protect puppies long enough to build their own antibodies after a vaccine, but not be too strong to interfere with that vaccine. This scientific tool gives our puppies the best start in life in terms of their immune health.

How Does It Work?

Each pregnancy requires a new test, as results may vary from one pregnancy to the next. You will also sometimes find out that for example protection against parvovirus might have a different timeline from protection against distemper. In those instances, I vaccinate my puppies with single vaccines. If the timelines for these viruses converge, then I vaccinate with combination vaccines.

Nomograph is a predictive test, meaning that it predicts with accuracy vaccination time, but there are certain assumptions – the main one is that the puppies nursed through the first 24 hours of life and received an adequate amount of colostrum. Nomograph only shows the mother's passive immunity, not whether it had a chance to pass to the puppy. If for some reason, the puppy was unable to nurse in the first day of life, that puppy might not have acquired enough MDAs and would require early vaccination under the guidance of your veterinarian.

When using canine nomograph—with normally nursing puppies—you can vaccinate your puppies once in early puppyhood—per the nomograph's result—and again once the puppy's immune system is more mature (after 16th week of life). To confirm immunity, you can follow up with a titer.

The Efficacy of Nomographs

Nomographs showed superior efficacy as compared to a traditional vaccination protocol. In a recent study, 506 puppies which had nomographs used were tested for their immunity to parvovirus and distemper against a group of 5,000 adults. These puppies showed similar rates of protection as adults. Another cohort of dogs under the age of one year that were vaccinated without the use of nomographs showed significantly less protection than the adult group.

Where To Get A Nomograph

I recommend sending blood serum from your dam to a specialized laboratory at The School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Wisconsin. Their state-of-the-art Companion Animal Vaccine and Immuno Diagnostic Service Laboratory (CAVIDS) offers this service in a very user-friendly format. Visit www.vetmed.wisc. edu/lab/cavids for submission information. You will find instructional videos, sample submission forms, and down-to-earth explanation of the science behind nomographs.

You would need to send 0.5 ml serum, which can be stored in a refrigerator up to two weeks before shipping. Best time for collection is early pregnancy, but CAVIDS would accept serum collected at any other time as well. The cost of the test is only \$55.

Our Norwich Terrier Club of Northern California members enjoy several non-competitive activities throughout the year.


We start with a springtime Fun Day. It includes a raffle, the Norwich chasing a squirrel tail on the lure course, a crazy sock race, and a catered lunch.

HOW TO MAKE YOUR DOG LIVE LONGER

As my dog grows older, I often look at his sugar face and hope I will have him for many more years. When I need to say goodbye to one of my dogs, I always wish we could have just a few more days together—I'm sure you have felt this way too. Believe it or not, that's one wish that you can make come true! You can easily increase

your dog's lifespan by up to two years and it won't cost you a thing. In fact, it will save you money! Too good to be true? Here's how!

In 2019, a group of scientists published a study that looked at the lifespans of over 50,000 dogs of twelve different breeds

living in North America. They asked a very simple question: What is the expected lifespan of dogs that are overweight when they visit a veterinary hospital in middle age ($6\frac{1}{2} - 8\frac{1}{2}$ years) as compared to dogs that are of normal weight? The authors defined overweight on a 5-point body condition scale which represented dogs described by veterinarians on visual examination and palpation as being: Very Thin – 1; Thin – 2; Normal – 3; Overweight – 4; or Markedly Obese – 5. Dogs in both the overweight and normal

categories were then matched by breed, sex, visit age, visit year, latitude, and longitude.

Dogs of a variety of sizes and from twelve of the most common breeds were selected, with more than 3,800 dogs of each breed. It is well-documented that dogs who have had their ovaries or testicles removed have a lower

> metabolic rate and tend to gain weight unless their food intake is carefully monitored—this study only examined lifespans of spayed or neutered dogs.

For all twelve breeds, dogs that were overweight died at a significantly younger age (see Table

1). The estimated reduction in median lifespan for the overweight group relative to the normal weight group ranged from five months for male German Shepherd Dogs, to two years and six months for male Yorkshire Terriers. Although the authors looked at only twelve breeds, the consistent finding that overweight dogs had shorter lives suggests that this effect is likely to affect every breed. The difference in lifespan between overweight and normal weight dogs was greatest for the small and medium-sized

dogs and less for dogs of the larger breeds. In other words, your Norwich Terrier could live up to two years longer if he or she is not overweight!

Dogs that are overweight are more susceptible to a variety of chronic conditions, including osteoarthritis and other orthopedic diseases, diabetes, cancer, respiratory, cardiovascular and renal disease, as well as a reduced quality of life. In a recent review, the financial impact of having an obese dog was estimated to be approximately \$2,000 per year. This provides significant financial incentives (in addition to the clear lifespan incentive) to keep our dogs at a healthy weight.

Although it is tempting to do so, we cannot assume that the median survival ages noted in these studies are typical. In order to ensure accurate data, this study only included dogs that 1) had not died before 9½ years of age and 2) continued to be cared for in the veterinary practices from which the data were obtained. Since many dogs die before 9½ years of age, these data show artificially extended lifespans. Darn it! I sure would have loved to know that the median lifespan of a Golden Retriever was 13 to 13½ years!

This study shows that we *do* have some control over how long our dogs live. By keeping your dog at a normal weight throughout its life you can stack the longevity cards in your dog's favor and when the time comes to say goodbye, chances are your dog will have lived longer than he or she would have had they been overweight. And that's great news!

BREEDER SPOTLIGHT

Linda McCutcheon

Q: Were dogs always part of your life?

Yes, dogs and any stray animal I found. My parents rolled their eyes every time I brought something home. My parents had dachshunds when we were little. When they bought a business they had a German Shepherd Dog.

Q: How did you become interested in Norwich?

When we were first married, Frank bought me a Westie for Mother's Day from a pet store. I wanted to learn how to groom myself and joined the West Highland White Terrier Club of Delaware Valley, and eventually the West Highland White Terrier Club of America. as well as the New Jersey breed club. I learned how to groom somewhat from the various programs the Club had. I tinkered in showing at the puppy matches. I ended up making it my hobby; showing and breeding West Highland White Terriers for years. (I won't say how many!!) Eventually I started looking to add a short legged terrier which required a little less show trimming. After paging through the AKC Official Publication of The Complete Dog Book, I decided on the Norwich Terrier and began a search for a show prospect puppy.

Q: What is your most memorable win?

I am fortunate to have had several great wins. In 2017 I showed GCHS CH Country Boy Looks Good Like Winston Should at the Kennel Club of Philadelphia National Dog Show (owned by Jim and Jen DeMason) in a very competitive Specials ring and landed the Best of Breed ribbon. He showed like a dream in his TV debut and went on to score a Group 4. And of course, showing Winston's Granddaughter, CH Country Girl Maid to Order, at the tender age of seven months old last October at the Montgomery County Kennel Club. Mindy went WB, BOW, and Best Bred by

Exhibitor from Classes. She later reaffirmed her quality by taking the Select Ribbon at Westminster, May 2024.

Q: Tell us about your breeding philosophy. How do you decide which puppies to keep?

Well, when comparing every puppy with the AKC standard, I understand there is no perfect conformation puppy. I accept the faults I can forgive. Temperament is important, both for show and family life. I like my dogs to be peoplepuppies with tail-up attitude. In 1996 when I first got into the breed, I noticed many Norwich in the ring had light bone; and missing teeth seemed common. Judges barely looked at the mouth. Since then, The Norwich Terrier Club of

America has addressed that issue. CH Country Girl Bon Bon possessed a strong rear drive that is important to me. I have tried to capture that movement in my breeding program. I also like breeders. Compare your grooming techniques with others and work to excel in show grooming. Find a local Show Handling class. Attend as many health and breeding seminars as you can. The

a strong head with that "get the rat" expression, although it seems harder to find in the girls! I have to admit, I do like to see a mischievous little puppy, as it shows spirit and spunk. I personally am not able to keep the litters as long as I would like, so as a rule, I make a choice by 11 or 12 weeks. Puppies change so much in a year, and there are always the "sleepers" so I'm sure I don't always pick the one for show that I should have. but it's important for me to have puppies bonded in their forever homes with lots of attention from their families.

Q: Do you have any advice for breeder/owner handlers?

First off, when you bring your little bundle of joy home, start looking to join either your local breed club, or if none is in your area, join an all-breed club. Even the all-breed clubs offer a wealth of information, and you will meet a host of dog show enthusiasts. Look into becoming a member of the Norwich Terrier Club of America as soon as you meet the requirements. You will want to learn as much as you can about the breed. Even if you are not an NTCA member, you can ask a member to get you a ticket for the Annual Dinner as a guest.

Go to as many Specialty Shows as you can. If you are new, even a fourth place ribbon is a thrill and you can learn so much competing with top

University of Pennsylvania Veterinary School has informative seminars, usually yearly. I used to look forward to attending them, and the lunch provided by the Culinary students was pretty good too! Many breed clubs also offer seminars for all breeds. Myra Savant-Harris, RN has a great seminar on breeding.

And finally, when you lose in the ring, try to be a good sport. We are all disappointed when we lose. Use your disappointment as a tool to work harder next time out. Have a friend take a video or photos so you can see how your dog looked from ringside. You may see things you have

to improve. You may see the reason the Judge missed you. Study the breed standard and be honest to yourself. All dogs have faults. Choose the faults you can live with. Listen to others, but if you have studied the standard, listen to yourself. And when you win, remember your competitors are feeling disappointment, so be gracious.

TRI-ING EVEN HARDER IN 2024



In Spring 2024, Rascal the three-legged Norwich Terrier earned two agility titles that were only far-fetched dreams when my husband Don and I received his cancer diagnosis 3½ years ago -MJP followed by MXP a couple of weeks later. This is what Norwich Terriers are made of.

But wait! There are other dog sports! AKC had instituted an in-person pilot program for threelegged dogs to compete in Obedience and Rally classes without jumps. Previously, they were prohibited from showing up in-person and could only compete by sending in videos.

Well, we better take advantage of the new program. Obedience seemed pretty straight forward: heel, sit, stay, come. Rally seemed like a joke. Walking a course with signs on the ground? What's the big deal? Rascal and I learned quickly that these are serious, difficult sports. In Obedience, except for a couple of commands to get started, not being able to talk to Rascal was very hard, especially during the off-leash exercises. "Rascal, come!" (but don't finish until I tell you to!) became a challenge. Why wait to be told to finish when he could just do it one fluid motion?

There's also a lot more to Rally signs than what first appears. Backing up is hard, especially when you only have three legs. Side stepping, come to front, and drop to a down while I'm walking away are just a few examples of the challenging exercises.

Rascal was more fried from Obedience and Rally classes than agility classes but our hard work paid off with a Beginner Novice (how low can you go!) Obedience Title, and Novice Rally and Rally Intermediate titles. One more Q and he will earn his CD.

The AKC pilot program ends in December. We are campaigning for AKC to make it permanent and allow three-legged dogs in Obedience and Rally classes with jumps too. AKC rewards Rascal for jumping in agility. It seems silly to prohibit him from jumping in Obedience and Rally.

ELITE PERFORMER LOGAN

Logan (CH Itsy Bitsy Thistledown I'm Still A Guy TKE) is now an 18-month old Norwich terrier, bred by Tonnie Willrich and Amanda Kozora. I was looking for a buddy for my two female Smooth Fox Terriers, Cayenne and Zara, and for my next agility dog. I picked up Logan when he was 10-11 weeks old and started using tricks as his foundation training for everything I planned to do in the future (Trick, Agility, Obedience and Rally). We didn't plan on doing Conformation; however, Logan likes to be the center of attention and earned his Championship in only eight shows with four Best of Breeds, multiple group ownerhandler placements, and one owner-handler Reserve Best in Show.

Then came trick training. He earned his AKC Novice trick dog title at just 16 weeks old; such a smart boy—I'd only had him for about a month. Many of the things in Novice trick are things you need for basic living and confidence building such as "get in your kennel", hand signal sits, and "touch my hand."

From there we went on to Intermediate tricks, which built upon our bond with more confidence builders such as balancing on a ball or wobble board followed by a shell game or puzzle.

Why stop now? On to Advanced tricks, which really challenge the dog and owner. I look for things the dog does naturally and turn them into a trick. Logan loved to go under things and hide from his sisters, so I marked a "hide" command. He loved jumping in the refrigerator so I marked it by giving it a name (I actually marked that to teach it as "No refrigerator"). It's all about communication, whether it's hand signals or verbals. In Advanced trick Logan learned to "down" fifteen feet away, touch a light to turn it on, and put his head down—all skills I can utilize in everyday life.

Once you have the basics down you get into some of the more challenging tricks. Not only do the dogs have fun doing them and love bonding with you, the tricks make everyone smile (including myself!). In Performer he learned retrieving skills to pick up my phone or keys, and then the fun stuff such as riding a skateboard or scooter. When you only have 4" legs it's really hard to find a scooter that fits, but my handy husband modified one and Logan thinks it's his Harley Davison and loves to ride it.

Each title of trick includes ten different tricks—forty tricks by the time you've reached Performer. In Elite Performer you develop a themed skit which can be read by a narrator. Our Elite Performer theme was "Rocky". In our skit Logan is a boxer set to take on his biggest challenger yet: Apollo Orange; our story is the days prior to the big event. Throughout the video Logan climbs stairs, pushes barrels, weaves, rides his scooter, and even gets into the refrigerator. The video consists of at least ten tricks from Intermediate to Performer levels. The performance should be able to be performed in front of a live audience, but can be done virtually. I utilized the video I created for Logan's Elite Performer title in the National AKC 2023 competition.

Logan was an overall qualifier and won #1 Norwich Terrier for AKC for 2023. According to AKC's records as of August of 2023 Logan was the only Norwich Terrier that has been awarded an Elite Performer title.

Anyone can do it and it's fun! Enjoy!



NOSEWORK WITH HELIX

I am proud to announce that Helix (Ch MACH Dignpop Central Dogma MKB MJB CA BCAT NW3 Elite L2C L1V L1I SWA SCE RATO CGC TKI VNX) is the first Norwich Terrier to achieve the NW3 Elite title in NACSW. level, there are six searches in a single day and the handler is not told how many scents there are in each venue. This makes NACSW more appropriate to real-life detection (of explosive devices, drugs, cash, etc.). There can even be

Although you might be familiar with the AKC Scent Work titles. Nosework was originated by the National Association of Canine Scent Work (NACSW) and they were offering scenting titles for years before the AKC jumped on the bandwagon (and to be honest, developed an easier scenting format, based on the NACSW scent titles). In nosework, there can be up to three essential oil scents (birch, clove and/or anise are used depending on the level) hidden in a variety of accessible or inaccessible sites within four different venues (outdoors,

Searches on cars were always the most difficult for him, but this time you can really see him telling me exactly where it is! zero hidden scents in some areas. which makes it really hard for the handler! The dog, of course, knows that there is nothing there, but the handler must believe the dog and not keep trying to convince the doa! To achieve the NW3 Elite title, the dog must pass three NW3 tests, meaning that on three separate days, the dog has found all of the locations where scents are hidden in six different venues on each day.

Whether you have tried AKC scent work or not, I encourage you to try NACSW nosework trials. They are a great deal of fun,

indoors, containers, and vehicles). The dog must search those areas and find all of the hidden scents. What makes the NACSW titles more challenging than AKC scent work is that the dog has to find all of the scents in all four venues (outdoors, indoors, containers, and vehicles) in a single day. your fellow competitors are really encouraging, and the venues are always interesting, different, and challenging. When you go home with that NACSW title, you know that you are bringing a real nosework champion home with you!



I was delighted to judge the Norwich Terrier specialty hosted by the Lone Star Norwich Terrier Club, which hosted three days of Norwich celebrations in San Antonio, TX. Their hospitality was beyond awesome; showing every exhibitor and judge every amenity possible.

I judged the Lone Star Norwich Terrier Specialty on Friday and I must say the entry was impressive, both in numbers and in quality. The specials class in particular was awash with quality.

My best-of breed dog was one which I have judged before and have found very pleasing. He was presented in beautiful condition - both weight-wise, muscle-wise, and his coat was pristine. He had the outline I look for: a short strong back good reach of neck, a well-set tail, and good amount of dog behind it.



Enough leg under him to move with the drive and extension offered by a balanced front and rear. He had a lovely head and expression with a nice dark eye. On the day, he was hard to fault. On Sunday evening, I would award him the Terrier group.

Winners Dog and Best of Winners came from the bred-by class- a well-made dog of correct size, he was presented in lovely condition; a good head and expression, he moved well and showed his heart out for his owner.

Best of Opposite Sex to a lovely red bitch; well made very sound, good proportions and she showed very well. My Winner's Bitch came from the 9 to 12 class as did my reserve winners. Both lovely puppies showing great promise. They moved well and carried themselves around round the ring with confidence.

Select Dog was a very lovely red dog very much in type like my breed winner he was presented in very good condition and showed very well on the day- he pressed the winner. Select Bitch quite a nice red bitch who was presented in good condition. She had a nice head and expression, a good eye and made a lovely outline going around the ring. The two dogs to which I gave Awards of Merit were both lovely representatives of the breed and on another day would be easy breed winners.

I would like to thank the Norwich Terrier Club of America for the invitation and the Loan Star Norwich Terrier Club for the wonderful hospitality and very warm welcome to Texas for their 15th Anniversary weekend.

I loved judging your beautiful dogs and on another day some placings could change. In a fabulous entry of 39 and just 4 absent my winners were:

BOB GCH Fishback Michan Hard Truth (Bitch) BOS GCH Fishback Michan Major Boothroyd BOW Ragus Silverrain (Bitch)

WD & BOH Verdant's Sweet Child O'Mine

Select Dog GCH Fishback Michan Doodle Bug

AOM GCH Maystar's Shonleh Michan Ruddy Duck (Dog)

In general I felt that from the dogs I saw the breed was in a better place than the last time I judged in the USA in 2011. Movement has definitely improved and there is more consistency of type.

Overall I found that coats are fabulous with the correct hard texture which is almost crispy to the touch. Most exhibits had excellent bone and substance, good body proportions and great temperaments. Heads were variable, quite a number lacked stop and a few others were too short in the muzzle. Eyes need watching, although colour was good. Large round protruding eyes are incorrect, really spoil the expression and would leave a dog exposed to damage whilst working. Only 3 dogs shown under me had a really correct small, dark, oval shaped eye.

When looking at the catalogue afterwards I see my BOB, BOS and Select Dog are all by the same sire, GCH CH Ragus OO' Seven so I guess he is helping to fix type.

The BOB is short backed, compact with a good length of neck, lovely head and expression, good bone and substance. Good reach in front. Showed her socks off for her handler, loved her. The BOS is similar but not quite the length of neck as the BOB.

Thank you to all the exhibitors and handlers for accepting my decisions with good grace.



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
